


2022 Secretary's Report

Fish Habitat Committee - Tim Plaza

Tree Drops is the program the Fish Habitat Committee will be working on this year. It entails finding shore-land owners willing to be involved in placing trees in the water along their shoreline. There are very specific rules and regulations that need to be followed as well as reports that must be made to the Department of Natural Resources.

The Fish Habitat Committee is willing to assist the homeowner with the project, as well as provide some of the cable and clamps required to anchor the trees. Tree size, tree species and where the tree was harvested are all spelled out in a DNR publication. Shared images of summer and winter tree drops and took questions.

Lake Information & Safety Committee - Len Christianson

"As the popularity of recreational boating continues to grow in Minnesota, so too does the size of boats and their motors. Moreover, new designs of watercraft, specifically, boats engineered to create large wakes for the primary purpose of wakesurfing, are elevating concerns around impacts to safety, lake and river health, shared-use accessibility, and degradation of property."

WI State Law/Regulation & Recommendations Boats

- Slow, no wake speed at less than 100 ft from shore, dock, raft, pier, swimmer, or restricted area state law/regulation.
- It is also common for boaters and jet skiers to stop abruptly at the buoy, causing even larger waves to hit the shoreline. According to the language above, boats and jet skis should be at a no-wake speed 100 feet before the buoy.
- It is not recommended to tow persons through a no-wake channel for safety concerns Wakesurf Boats
 - Wakesurf boats require distances greater than 500 feet from the shoreline/docks & other boats (this is more than twice the distance from typical recreational boats)

• Under both slow and fast speed conditions, the wakesurf boats produced the largest waves in terms of height, energy, and power when compared to the non-wakesurf boats.

BE A RESPONSIBLE WATER SPORT PARTICIPANT BY COMPLYING WITH THE WSIA (WATER SPORT INDUSTRY ASSOCIATION) GUIDANCE FOR WAKE BOAT OPERATORS. Maintain a minimum distance of 200 feet from any shoreline and others enjoying the lake. RED CEDAR LAKES ASSOCIATION RECOMMENDS 400 FEET.

Minimize repetitive passes in the same area. Keep music at reasonable levels.

Remember your wake has an impact on:

- Property damage
- Shoreline erosion
- The lake bed and wildlife habitat
- The safety of others on the lake
- The transportation of AIS (Aquatic Invasive Species) in the ballast tanks and on trailers

Key Focus in 2022 Includes...

- Volunteers needed to regularly sample water on each of the 3 main lakes and report to Citizen Lake Monitoring Network
- Coordinate with WDNR and outside consulting services to identify further testing locations
- Received 2 Water Quality Grants for \$75K
- Working on comprehensive management plan

Aquatic Invasive Species Committee - Tom Goodwin & Brett Heinlein

Good News! Aquatic Invasive Species remain stable in our lakes We continue to have just four species of AIS (Curly Leaf Pondweed, Chinese Mystery Snails, Purple Loosestrife and Rusty Crayfish). Zebra mussels and Eurasian Milfoil are in neighboring lakes and probably our biggest threats,

2019 - 2022 Grant:

- Provides up to \$180,885 (state funding) for AIS control and water quality studies
- Remaining funding \$115,260 (state funding)
- WI DNR approved grant extension to 12/31/2023.

2022 AIS Actions:

- CLP herbicide treatment in northeast end of Balsam lake and channel between Balsam and Red Cedar Lakes
- 3.4 water acres treated in June
- Woody debris studies for Hemlock and Bass Lakes
- Ongoing monitoring of AIS through the summer
- Zebra mussel plates
- Raking weeds near boat landing and stream entrances
- Eradication of Purple Loosestrife
- Hand removal during July & August by Nature Committee
- Beetle raising with help of Birchwood school. Release took place on June 27th.

Murphy Flowage

- Identified as source of phosphorus into Hemlock Lake
- CLP bed mapping study performed in June, No significant presence of CLP currently

- Surrounded by County forest land
- No one is actively monitoring



Proposed change to our By-laws to include Murphy Flowage as part of our watershed. **Benefits**:

- Ability to determine source of phosphorus loading coming into our watershed
- Allows RCLA to use current and future DNR grant money for the monitoring and management of AIS and Water Quality work
- Allows RCLA to have been control over the watershed coming into Hemlock Lake If we do include Murphy Flowage as part of the RCLA the following steps could be taken to help ensure the ongoing health of the flowage.
 - Install a decontamination site
 - Perform ongoing monitoring for AIS
 - Monitor and eliminate purple loosestrife
 - Conduct water quality sampling
